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Deception: Usually the initial design of the study will be accurate. However, occasions
do arise where it is necessary to use deception in the study. Deception
can occur in a number of ways. The researcher may intentionally
deceive the participant about the nature of the study. This is possible
when the researcher is unable to obtain meaningful data given the nature of the event. All
elements of deception will have been approved by the applicable ethics committee. At
the end of the study, the researcher is obliged to describe the deception and to explain why
it was necessary.

Confidentiality: Only the researcher and the research team have access to information that
specifically identifies the data collected. Although data collected from
participants can be used in a publication, you can assure your
confidentiality.

Complaints: If you have any complaints you can bring a Research Participant
Complaint Form to the Psychology Office (Mahesh Level 15). You can also be contacted by the
Coordinator and will remain completely confidential. Alternatively, you can contact the
Coordinator directly if you prefer.

Alternative Assignment: If you are an object participating as a subject in any research, you
will be asked to complete the assignment by the end of Week 4. The Coordinator will arrange an
alternative assignment for you to complete in order to obtain the required grade for each
participant (4%).

Assessment 4: Final Exam (60%)
